SUPREME COURT TO BEGIN SESSION

SPRING MEETING OF HIGH BODY WILL BE TAKEN UP WITH PLENTY OF WORK.

Des Moines, April 28.—The May term of the supreme court will be opened next Tuesday, with a docket containing 152 cases. The first division next week will hear seventy-six cases and the second division will have seventy-five cases the week following. So far only one case is scheduled for the full bench period to open June 21.
The most important criminal case to be submitted is the appeal of Mathew O'Donnell of Lee county, sentenced to hang Sept. 3, 1915, for the alleged murder of his wife. When the legislature refused to pass the Gillette bill to abolish capital punishment, it took hope of escaping the death penalty in that direction from O'Donnell. The attorneys for the condemned man do not ask the supreme court to lighten the sentence. It is probable that the appeal for mercy will be made to the governor later, if the case goes against O'Donnell. The man is charged with beating his wife while intoxicated, so that she died as the result of the wounds.

SISTERS CLAIM FRAUD WAS USED

JOHNSON COUNTY COURT HAS WILL CASE WHICH PROMISES TO BE SENSATIONAL.

Iowa City, April 28.—A big will contest involving the estate of the late William Ellenberger, long a wealthy farmer of Johnson county, was instituted in the district court here. The property is worth from \$75,000 to \$100,000. The contestants, children of the dead man, are Mesdames Maud Firkel and Hannah Evans. They accuse William and Nathan Ellenberger, their brothers, with using undue influence over an old and mentally unsound father, to secure the signing of the will. They attack the document as false and fraudulent and ask Judge Howell to set it aside. The family is prominent throughout the community, and the case is likely to be sensational.

FISH BONE FINAL CAUSE OF DEATH

YOUNG MAN AT FORT MADISON SUGGUMBS FROM QUEER INJURY AFTER HARD FIGHT

Fort Madison, April 28.—After struggling in a one sided fight against death for two weeks, with a group of physicians straining themselves to their utmost in an effort to aid the young man to overcome the great handicap, G. E. Hicklen, passed away at the Santa Fe Employees' hospital. The death was a general attack of blood poisoning which followed complications growing out of an instance when the young man swallowed a fish bone several weeks ago, the object passing through his intestines into the cavity of the abdomen. The case was without precedent in local medical circles and attracted the attention of all physicians and surgeons in the city.

Dubuque, April 28.—An incendiary fire caused a loss of \$260,000 Tuesday in the Carr Ryder & Adams Sash and Door plant, the Key City Gas plant and the McDonald pump plant were also damaged.
