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Uncle Sam Makes Study of Lightning Rods and Explains Their Usefulness

Washington, D. C., Aug. 2.—Lightning rod agents, beware!

Uncle Sam is still on your trail. He presented the facts on your goods when you were making your golden harvest of coin away back in the '70s.

Here is the substance of ten questions and answers on the lightning rod issue just published by the department of agriculture:

1. Do lightning rods really protect buildings? Yes, but the rods must be of proper character, properly installed and properly grounded in relatively moist earth.

2. Do lightning rods on a building increase the danger of its being struck? Opinion is divided; but a properly rodged house may be struck several times without injury.

3. Should lightning rods be put up with or without insulators? Without buildings with metal roofs, or in which any metal construction employ.

4. Are gilded or otherwise expensive points of platinum or special metal or of fanciful construction necessary? No; not in the least.

5. What material is best for the conductors or rods? Galvanized iron not less than one-fourth inch in diameter, carefully installed and inspected at intervals, is recommended.

6. Should the rods be made in the form of solid rods, flat bars or bands, stranded twisted cables, woven stranded ribbons or hollow twisted cables?

7. Must lightning rods be connected to the earth? Yes, by all means and most effectively.

8. Are government buildings provided with lightning rods? Yes, many of them, but naturally not every one.

9. Does the government use the material or the rods, or the system of any particular agency? No; there is nothing mysterious or exceptional about lightning rods.

10. What is the best arrangement of rods on a building? A building completely screened and surrounded by metal rods, or a cage or network of substantial metallic conductors.

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World Records Broken at Frisco

MARKS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED ON ACCOUNT OF GALE THAT AIDED RUNNERS.

San Francisco, Calif., Aug. 2.—With a half gale favoring the runners, two world's records were bettered and two equalled Saturday in the finals of the far western championships which were decided on the Panama Pacific International exposition stadium.

The Pacific association of the Amateur Athletic union won the meet with 93 points. The Southern Pacific association was second with 59.

Gay Hobgood of the Multnomah Athletic club of Portland, was the biggest individual point winner, placing first in both the two mile and one mile events.

R. McBride of the Rocky Mountain association ran a magnificent race against H. Drew, the record holder in the 220 yard dash, and bested the tape two yards ahead of the champion in 21.15 better than the existing world's mark.

A. F. Muentzer of the Olympic club bettered the existing world's figures in the 440 yard hurdles which he negotiated in 53.3-5. The records equalled were made by Fred Kelly in the 120 yard hurdles in 15.14, and by F. Murray in the 220 yard low hurdles in 23.3-5.
