LOCAL ARTIST DIES IN LOS ANGELES

JOHANNES SCHEIWE NOTED FOR HIS PAINTINGS SUCCUMBS IN COAST CITY.

Mrs. John Ellmaker received word today announcing the death of her father, Johannes Scheiwe, until two years ago a resident of Ottumwa, which took place Tuesday at Los Angeles, Cal. No particulars were given and it is not known whether the remains will be brought on here for burial or not. The only other survivor is his wife.

The work of Mr. Scheiwe is well known in Ottumwa and is to be found in a number of homes, churches and in the library. In the latter building are perhaps the largest number of his paintings for he decorated the interior of the library but a few years ago. Mr. Scheiwe was the first instructor of David Edstrom, the noted Ottumwa painter and sculptor, whose work has won him international recognition and the patronage of royalty abroad.





AGENCY COUPLE OBSERVE THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY





MAN'S IDENTITY IS ESTABLISHED

FLOATER FOUND IN RIVER TUESDAY MORNING IS DAN DAVIS OF BIDWELL.

A red necktie knitted for him by his mother was the means by which the body of the man found floating in the river Tuesday morning was identified as Dan Davis of Bidwell. James Fox, his stepfather, Frank Davis and Bill Fox, brothers, arrived in Ottumwa this morning and identified the body. The remains were buried Tuesday afternoon and it was necessary to dig them up for identification.

Mr. Davis was last seen Saturday afternoon and it is thought that he was drowned Saturday night. The body was badly decomposed and this led Coroner H. A. Spilman to believe that the body had been in the water for some time. The hot weather on Sunday and Monday, however, is attributed to having affected the body. It was necessary to bury the body at once and the coroner and jury reviewed the remains Tuesday morning.

An inquest was held this morning at 10 o'clock and a jury composed of Chris Myers, George Diltz and A. R. Blum found that the man came to his death presumably by drowning. This morning the relatives called and the remains were disinterred and the identification established. Mr. Davis was thirty years of age and is survived by his mother, Mrs. James Fox of Bidwell, a wife and two children and two brothers, William and Frank. He was a member of the Bidwell local U. M. W. A. No. 39. The remains will be taken to Albia Thursday afternoon, where burial will be made.
