Stock Market

New York, July 28.—Stocks were yeely supplied on the advance and this, combined with the fresh selling of Canadian Pacific, Alcohol and some of the preceding day's weak issues, effected by St. Paul and New Haven, notwithstanding the customary recessions. Equipments and minor industrials forfeited about half their advance in speculation, but held in specialties of various descriptions, including Marine preferred, Maxwell and Willits-Overland and Cuba Can Sugar. There partial rallies toward middle when trading lapsed into extreme dullness. Bonds were steady with lighter offerings of international issues.

Stocks continued their uncertain course at today's dull and contracted opening, with a fairly even distribution of advances and declines. Sears-Roebuck materially supplemented yesterday's gain of over 6 points and some of the war and equipment issues were substantially better, particularly Industrial Alcohol, the Locomotives, Studebaker and American Car. Shipping shares again tended downward. Ralls were not much altered aside from further pressure upon New Haven and some inquiry for Reading. The entire list improved later under lead of United States Steel.

The closing was steady.

Grain Review

Chicago, July 28.—Black rust damage increasing and the infected territory widening caused a fresh advance today in the price of wheat. Trade was relatively light. The opening, which ranged from 1/4 to 1 1/4 @ 1 1/4c higher, with September at \$1.24 to \$1.24 1/4 and December at \$1.27 to \$1.27 1/4, was followed by a moderate reaction but then another upturn.

Later, the market underwent a material sag owing to assertions by a prominent expert that crop losses in the Dakotas and Minnesota would perhaps not reduce the yield there under a seven year average. The close was weak 1c to 1 1/2c net lower, with September at \$1.22 1/4 @ 1 1/4c and December at \$1.25 1/4.

Dry hot weather carried corn up-grade. After opening 1/4 to 1 1/4 @ 1 1/4c higher, the market held fairly steady.

Subsequently, the market receded as result of reports that within last ten days nearly 1,000,000 bushels of Argentine corn had been bought to come to the United States. The close was unsettled, ranging from 1 1/4c decline to 1/4 @ 1/4c advance, as compared with yesterday's finish.

Oats hardened with other cereals. Provisions average a little higher, influenced by firmness in the hog market.
