MISSOURI BOY IS KILLED BY TRAIN

Cameron, Mo., July 31.—Arnold, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Beechner of the community four and one-half miles southwest of Cameron, was instantly killed by Burlington passenger train No. 55, the accident occurring at the crossing a quarter of a mile east of the home of the boy's grandmother, Mrs. Adam Loos. At the time of the accident the boy was en route with a team hitched to a hay wagon, to the home of his grandmother. Just how the accident happened is not known, as the boy was alone. The crossing is not obscured and trains from the east can be seen for quite a distance. Perhaps the most plausible reason is that the boy was watching a threshing crew at work on the Gus Heinz farm, a short distance west of the fatal crossing, and did not notice the approaching train, which was running late and no doubt at a fast speed. The engineer would be on the opposite side of his engine from any one approaching from the direction the boy was coming.
