Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—Pennsylvania and Dartmouth played an even game on Saturday. The Pennsylvania outplayed the Hanover team in every period and in nearly every department of the game and were deprived of a probable victory through a fumble which Dartmouth turned to advantage. It was in the third period that Dartmouth made her seven points. Pennsylvania was hammering the Dartmouth line when the ball was passed to Hobby Light. He tumbled as he hit the ball and Captain Gerrish picked up the ball on Pennsylvania's thirty-five yard line and was away for thirty yards before he was thrown and in two plays Dartmouth took the ball over for the score. The whole Ames team crossed the tape before the first Iowa man had appeared. The winner, Hawthorn, of Ames, covered the five mile course in 27 minutes and 50 seconds. Charles E. Courtney, the Cornell rowing coach, is 67 years old. Thirty-five years ago he was one of the world's greatest scullers.

PURPLE BEATS IOWA ELEVEN

NORTHWESTERN COMES BACK STRONG IN SECOND PERIOD; INDIANA SWAMPED.

Chicago, Nov. 13.—Northwestern moved another step toward the "Big Nine" championship Saturday, defeating Iowa, 20 to 13, in an uphill game. Coming from behind, Northwestern scored three touchdowns in the second half after being outplayed in the first two periods. Iowa's only touchdown was scored by Scott, who smashed his way over early in the first period. Davis added six more points to Iowa's total, booting two field goals in the second half. The game was spectacular as Williams, Brightmire, Kohler, Underhill and Davis tore off end runs for long gains and each eleven used the forward pass to advantage. Northwestern, which with Ohio state remains undefeated in the western conference race, must defeat Purdue next Saturday to keep its slate clean. 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LOCALS PLAY CENTERVILLE

Centerville Defeats Ottumwa 38 to 0; Unable to Stop Opponents' Backfield. The Ottumwa high school football team was badly defeated at Centerville Saturday, 38 to 0, by the Centerville high school. The loss came as a distinct surprise and shock to the Red and White players and their supporters, for Ottumwa beat Centerville four weeks ago by a 27 to 9 count and there was every reason to believe that the local had improved since. Injuries were to a great extent responsible for the defeat, but over-confidence was also partly to blame. Snow and Fisher were kept out of the game from the start because of injuries, and Dooley Sumner was taken out early in the first period when he was hurt. Before the game, which was regarded as soft for Ottumwa, there was no thought of defeat, but only as to how big a score would be rolled up. Millet played a nice game at half back but was unused to the position. Hampton was unable to get away for his usual gains and at no time played up to his general standard. Teamwork was sadly lacking, and time and time again the backs were nailed behind the lines for losses. Ottumwa, however, fought desperately, once the boys found that Centerville was not to be the soft pickings as in the earlier game, but could not overcome the end runs and line smashes of the Centerville backfield. Ottumwa on form should have won the game, but an off day, coupled with over-confidence and injuries spelled their defeat. William Lever, a 11 year old Centerville boy, received a broken leg when several players chasing a ball out of bounds into the crowd ran over him. He was removed from the field and medical attention secured and is doing well today.
