He came to Missouri when a young man and on December 25, 1891, he was united in marriage to Adelaide Ohaever. Later on he came to Ottumwa where he resided for thirteen years. To this union nine children were born. Two babies preceded him to that city where they need no sun.

He leave to mourn his loss his wife and seven children: Mrs. Lillian Bridgeman of Ottumwa, Mrs. Violet Hoxsey of Cedar Rapids, and Melesia, Sylvia, James, Gerald and babe Rosamond, all of which are still at home; also one sister, Mrs. Anna Benedict of Eddyville, and a number of nieces and nephews and a host of friends.

He was always a kind and loving husband and father and a good neighbor, liked by all who knew him and always ready to lend a helping hand to any who might need it.

He had been a patient sufferer for almost three years, at all times willing to submit to God's will. He entered the Ottumwa hospital September 9, 1916, and was taken to the Iowa City hospital on October 5, 1916. Everything that was possible was done for him in Ottumwa and Iowa City to restore him to health, and there he submitted to an operation from which he never recovered.

He was a man that loved to talk of the joy of the life everlasting, at all times loving to uphold the banner of Jesus Christ. He had a broad understanding of the bible and it was great pleasure to his friends to have him converse with them along bible lines. His last message to his loved ones, he said that he had well learned the meaning of that song, "On Christ the Solid Rock I stand, All Other Grounds are Sinking Sand," and that he was prepared to go to his maker, the Almighty God if it was God's will.

The funeral services were held from the McPherson Avenue Baptist chapel at 1:30 Sunday, conducted by Rev. B. F. Patt. The chapel was packed by those that had come to pay their last tribute to one they loved. Floral tributes, many and beautiful, attested faith in a loved one called to his reward.—Contributed.
