## Wanted: A Stage Line to Rothwell.

An effort is being made to establish a first-class daily stage line between Hazel Green and Rothwell, the terminus of the Kentucky and South Atlantic railway—one coach to leave Hazel Green in time to connect with afternoon train for Mt. Sterling, and the other to leave Rothwell after arrival of morning train from Mt. Sterling, for Hazel Green. The establishment of such a line would be highly appreciated by the multitude which annually visit Hazel Green, and it would be liberally patronized by merchants and others of Hazel Green, Maytown, Pomroyton, Harriba and Frenchburg, immediately on the line, to say nothing of the immense traffic—passenger, express and light freight—it would secure from the country above us, and the adjacent country along its route. A six-passenger Concord coach with two horses can be run for nine months in the year, and with the roads kept in good condition, which the county judges propose to do, the same coach can be run during winter with four horses. The owner of the line could secure an agency for the Adams express company and the mail contract. Who will undertake it? To be a success, it must be managed by men of experience, and we therefore nominate T. H. Irvine & Co., of Lexington, Ky., as the most likely to render perfect satisfaction.

## The Shooting of Adams by Vansant.

Mr. Joseph Amyx, of our county, was in to see us on Friday last, and as he was in Cracker's Neck, Elliott county, on the 10th inst., was conversant with the killing of Adams by Jonas Vansant. He informs us that Adams had been hounding Vansant all during the day, and threatening him bodily harm. Vansant avoided a difficulty by keeping away from him, but late that afternoon, supposing Adams had left the village, he went into a grocery to make some purchases before going home, when Adams, who was in the store, armed with a double barreled shot gun, stepped forward and presented the gun to fire. Vansant, however, seeing his danger quickly seized the muzzle and threw it up with his left hand, and with his right fired his revolver, the ball striking Adams just between the eyes. Vansant immediately surrendered to the authorities, and his trial was set for Saturday last. Many of our subscribers remember Mr. Vansant as a hard working, sober, discreet young man, as he has worked at his trade in our county.

There is no necessity for the county paying for the right of way, as every person owning land on the proposed line with whom I have talked will cheerfully give them the right of way through lands. If there is any one who will not give the right of way, I think our people will by subscription raise sufficient money to buy it, so do not let the right of way deter you in your good work, colonel, but give us the Kentucky Union right speedily.
