The candidates for Congress in this district, Hon. W. P. Taulbee and Hon. W. L. Hurst, addressed the people at Campbell last Friday. It was not our pleasure to be present, but from what we learn Mr. Hurst was literally "chewed up" by his opponent. Hon. D. S. Godsey informs us that Mr. Taulbee made one of the finest speeches he ever heard, and says that Mr. Hurst is not at all posted in national affairs. Jim Lacy, an attaché of this office, says "Taulbee made the master speech I ever heard fall from the lips of man." He also says he heard Republicans say they would vote for Taulbee. Next Tuesday is the day, and our readers can vote as they please, but we intend to vote for Taulbee, believing him to be the best man, and entitled to re-election by precedent.

The tangle of the Democracy in the Third district has been adjusted, as the committee of the district held a meeting in connection with the State Central Committee at Frankfort last week, and passed a resolution calling on both Rhea and Haswell to withdraw and the district committee to meet at Russellville on the 27th, and select a new candidate to oppose the Republican candidate. To this both Rhea and Haswell acquiesced. Here's to Judge George Edwards, of Logan, may he be the choice. None better could be made.

Mrs. Ransom, of Lexington, Ky., will sail for England, about November 1st, to receive her share of the Shreve estate. There is now in the bank of England awaiting the order of 24 heirs, of which Mrs. Ransom is one, the sum of one hundred million five hundred thousand dollars. Mrs. Ransom's share of this vast sum of money is \$4,145,883. With her already large estate this will make her the wealthiest woman in Kentucky, and probably the fourth wealthiest woman in North America.

A letter was shown us by a gentleman of this town, from a party living in Texas, in which he stated that Hon. Joseph Sayers said in a speech in the city of Georgetown, Texas, that W. P. Taulbee, of Kentucky, was one of the smartest men in Congress.

A bloody affray occurred at Somerset Friday morning between special Bailiff Henry Bogle and U. S. Commissioner F. N. Logan. They had some trouble a short time ago over a moonshiner named Baker, an account of which was published at the time, and ever since they have not been on good terms. Friday morning Bogle visited Logan's office for the purpose of looking over some affidavits and the trouble was renewed. Both drew their pistols, and a deadly conflict ensued in a room 20x60 feet. Logan shot twice when his pistol failed to work, and he grabbed a hatchet and cut Bogle, laying his skull bare. Bogle fell at the first of the firing, shot through the center of the breast, and the rest of his shots were fired while he was down and had hold of Logan. Logan was shot in the throat, the ball coming out of his mouth, and near the left shoulder blade, which is only a flesh wound. Bogle is insensible and can not recover, as either the bullet would have proved fatal. Logan's wound is not fatal though it is quite serious and his mouth is badly shattered. Logan probably saved his own life by getting hold of the hatchet, which happened to be within reach, as Bogle kept on firing after he was down until he was struck on the head. Both men are "dead game". Logan is cool while Bogle is excitable. Logan is a very quiet, peaceably disposed gentleman, and will avoid a difficulty if he can. Bogle is somewhat of a bully and has had a great many difficulties at Mt. Sterling Gazette.

Fined for Contempt.
Monday in the Federal Court at Louisville Judge Barr fined Judge B. F. Day and B. F. McCormick, of this city \$100 each for contempt of Court. It will be remembered that last winter Judge Barr appointed Geo. B. Harper Receiver for the Ky. & S. A. Railroad, and about the same time Judge Cooper, of the Circuit Court, appointed B. F. McCormick Receiver, with instructions to take possession of the road, peaceably if possible, by force if necessary. Acting on the instructions of Judge Cooper, McCormick, accompanied by Sheriff Robinson and Judge Day, his attorney, went to the Ky. & S. A. depot and took forcible possession of the road. McCormick and Judge Day were then arrested by order of the U. S. Court with the above result. It looks a little singular that they should be compelled to pay a fine for obeying an order of court.—Mt. Sterling Gazette.

Considerable excitement prevailed here Friday afternoon on receipt of the news of a tragedy which was enacted that morning near Kiddville, in which Mrs. Vivian Daniel, the wife of one of our well known citizens was seriously, if not fatally wounded by one Watts, a citizen of that neighborhood. Watts and son

rented land from Daniel last year on the shares. In the settlement sometime ago of the rent and division of the proceeds the parties disagreed and the matter was referred to arbitrators for adjustment. On Friday morning Watts and son came to Daniel's house, armed with shot guns, and demanded payment of money adjudged them by the arbitrators. Cliff Daniel, son of Vivian Daniel, paid the money and told them to leave the place. A fierce quarrel ensued, during which the elder Watts discharged his gun at young Daniel, missing him. Young Daniel sprang into the house and came out with a gun, discharging it at elder Watts, missing his aim, whereupon the younger Watts fired at Daniel, and the contents of the gun missing him, struck Mrs. Daniel, who was in range of the shot, fall in the breast and side. Watts and his son were arrested Saturday and placed in jail at Mt. Sterling.—Clark County Democrat.

The Speaking.
Hon. W. P. Taulbee and Capt. W. L. Hurst spoke to a large crowd at the Court House yesterday afternoon. "Our Pres" opened the ball by a speech of one hour which was a scathing denunciation of the Radical policy. Taulbee is a smooth, agreeable talker and showed that he was well versed in all matters pertaining to State and National affairs. His speech abounded in statistics and general information, and was delivered in his usual happy and eloquent style. The frequent bursts of applause testified to the hold he has upon the hearts and minds of our people. The account of his stewardship was eminently satisfactory to his constituents and there is not the slightest disposition to change.

Capt. Hurst is no match for his opponent in debate. He is evidently not posted in some of the most important requisites of a Congressman. He advocates the idea of making the silver dollar a legal tender at its bullion value, thus making the measure of all values subject to the fluctuations of the bullion market and laying it liable to manipulations of foreign powers. His idea of colonizing the negroes in Northern Mexico is on a par with many of his ideas on other subjects. He claims the credit of the forfeiture of the unearned land grants for his party but fails to say why the Republican Senate cut down the amount from eighty millions to fifty millions. He utterly failed to pick a flaw in the record of Taulbee, and devoted most of the time to the consideration of State finances. Even in this case Democratic economy is apparent. Since 1866 the total increase of taxation, less the increase for school purposes, shows an actual decrease of taxation for State purposes. This, too, in the face of the fact that property was assessed at a much higher rate than then now.

To sum up the case, Taulbee has made an excellent representative, is entitled by precedent to re-election, is a fine convincing speaker, an excellent mixer and has a majority of 2,300 to stand on. Hurst has no record as a legislator, is by no means the equal of Taulbee on the stump, and must overcome a majority of 2,300. It is safe to predict that Taulbee's majority will be nearer 4,000 than 2,500 in November.—Clark County Democrat.

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
