THE NEWS.

KENTUCKY KNOWLEDGE.

Mrs. Pat Hunt is on trial in Paris, charged with the murder of Rick Thomas. The Governor of Colorado has issued a sweeping quarantine against Kentucky cattle. It's poor candidate who can't make a "name" with some other fellow nowadays. The fight for second place on the Democratic ticket has about narrowed down to Judge Hazelrigg and Senator Bryan. Eli Farmer has been nominated for the Legislature by the Republicans and J. J. Stephenson by the prohibitionists, at Somerset. Joseph Williams, a wealthy farmer of Owen county who died recently, bequeathed \$30,000 to the Baptist Orphans' home of Louisville.

In the Democratic State Convention at Louisville on the 4th of next month it will require three hundred and eighty-four votes to nominate.

The Democratic convention in this State and Texas, and the Republican convention in Ohio will all be held on the 4th of next month.

The friends of General Buckner have been claiming Clark county, but a well-posted citizen of Winchester, says Senator Harris has a walkover.

There is a bolt among the Democrats in the Nicholasville District against the Legislative nominee, W. T. Jones. An independent will be nominated.

The Governor has pardoned Will Muir, of Lexington. The last term of the Fayette Circuit Court sentenced Muir to the penitentiary for two years for forgery.

The opening skirmish in the Democratic gubernatorial campaign came off Saturday, and resulted in decided victory for Senator Harris.—Maysville Bulletin.

Richard Raiser, of Henry county, Kentucky, was found, with his body badly mangled. While cutting saw-logs one of them rolled over him, killing him instantly.

The production of whisky in this State for the month of March amounted to 3,152,859 gallons. If that rate is maintained a few months, the cry of over-production will be loud.

Brother Bosley of the Winchester Sun, thinks General Buckner made a mistake when he bought the Clark county Democrat and turned "his fresh young editor loose without a muzzle on."

Judge John T. Hazelrigg, of West Liberty, Morgan county, Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor was here a short time Monday. He has been in the southwestern part of the State, and reports his chances good in that region.—Maysville Bulletin.

Judge Richards expresses confidence of winning the nomination for Attorney General. General Hardin is just as confident. That's the way the matter stands at present, and the situation is decidedly interesting to the supporters of both aspirants.—Maysville Bulletin.

The opinion is steadily gaining that Cleveland will be renominated. There is but little doubt that he is the choice of the people. The president's warfare against him by the Cincinnati Enquirer and the New York Sun is the strongest indication that he is in the lead.

GENERAL GOSSIP.

It is said that Bonanza John Mackey has "cornered" the entire California wheat crop.

Three miners in a coke pit at Connelville, Pa., were killed by gas, fire cutting off escape.

Northern cities are flooded with forged Virginia bonds, known as "Biddleberger threes."

The New York Sun is not for Cleveland for a second term. The Sun never was for Cleveland.

The king of Tonga Island is butchering the Wesleyan Methodists, both missionaries and converted natives.

The reports from the drought-stricken district of Texas indicate great suffering on the part of both man and beast.

Eddie Edwards and Lena Fry, each aged seventeen, of Frederick, Md., fought a duel with knives. Lena was killed.

John Fernandez was accidentally killed by Henry Bernard, at New Orleans, while fencing the foil entering his eye and penetrating the brain.

West Virginia prohibitionists say they have engaged Dr. Leonard, of Ohio, and Senators Maxey and Reagan, of Texas, to stump the state for them this summer.

On the 19th inst a coal fleet left Pittsburgh with 9,749,000 bushels of coal for Cincinnati, 3,057,900 bushels for Louisville and 1,635,100 bushels for sixteen barges containing 9,000 tons of steel bars for Cairo and St. Louis.

Maj. John E. Blaine, paymaster in the United States army, and brother to James G. Blaine, is lying at the point of death at Hot Springs, Ark. His condition is so precarious that there is no hope of his recovery.

Jim Buchanan's Story.

On the 1st of this month, old man James Ross, a very respectable citizen of Wolfe county, was killed by James Buchanan who was under the influence of liquor, and the act was regarded as a willful and unprovoked murder. Buchanan gives the following statement of the affair: "Am 26 years old; drink sometimes. This is my first grave offense. The morning of the killing started out with my brother's pistol to chase some cartridges for him; concluded to trade it for a rifle, but failing in this was on my road home and stopped at Mr. Ross' house. Pistol was not concealed, and Ross asked to see it. As I handed it to him my finger was on the trigger which was self-acting, and it went off and killed Mr. Ross. Made no effort to escape. It was purely accidental. We were the best friends. Regret it very much and trust the people of Wolfe county will forgive me for causing so much trouble and expense. Whiskey did it."—Mt. Sterling Gazette.

Deputy Marshal W. T. Day came in last Friday with five prisoners from Wolfe county, charged with violating the Internal Revenue Laws. They were tried by Commissioner Wood. Andrew Lawson and Kelly Fuika, charged with retailing whisky, were discharged. Wm. Barker, charged with illicit distilling, was held in the sum of \$500 to appear at May term of U. S. Court in Covington. Nicholas Combs, illicit distilling and retailing, was also held to answer. It is remarkable fact that the latter has been arrested sixteen times for violating the Internal Rev. laws and has escaped conviction every time.—Mt. Sterling Gazette.

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
