DOWNED ONCE AGAIN.

Taft Wins the Presidency; Langly Elected to Congress; Adams and Kash Victorious in the Judicial Race.

The election Tuesday passed off so quietly in Hazel Green that none would have thought anything out of the ordinary was going on. Nothing to mar the peace and quietude of anyone occurred during the day. Liquor was conspicuous by its absence, and not a drunken man was seen on the streets. Men went to the polls, marked their ballots and went away satisfied that every vote would be counted as it was polled. The vote at this precinct was larger than it had ever been and yet many who might have voted failed to make use of their franchise. So far as can be learned at this stage of the game the Republicans have elected their President, but in several states which went Republican for the national ticket Democratic Governors were elected. This congressional district has in all probability elected Langley, Republican, to succeed himself in Congress, though his election is yet somewhat in doubt. Adams has possibly been elected Circuit Judge by a small majority, as well as Kelly Kash Commonwealth's Attorney.

In this precinct the vote stood: Presidential electors, R. R. Friend, D., 166; J. J. Moore, R., 91. Congressman, Amos Davis, D., 167; John W. Langley, R., 95. Circuit Judge, J. B. White, D., 167; J. P. Adams, R., 95. Commonwealth's Attorney, A. H. Stamper, D., 147; Kelly Kash, R., 113.

In the congressional race Langley's majority is given at 2,651, while in the judicial contest the majorities are said to be in the neighborhood of 600.

Up to the hour of going to press we have no positive figures, yet the foregoing will show about how everything went, and we still have four years more of Rooseveltism.


