CUT TAX ON MOTOR CARS

Senate Committee Believes 5 Per Cent Enough—Other Reductions.

Washington, Oct. 19.—The 10 per cent taxes fixed by the House on passenger motor cars and motor cycles were cut in half today by the Senate finance committee.

House taxes of 10 per cent on sporting goods, cameras and photographic supplies were accepted. The tax on chewing gum which was made 6 per cent by the House, was reduced to 4 per cent, but the House levy of 10 per cent on candy was approved.

The House provisions levying taxes on firearms and ammunition when sold other than to the government were adopted as was the provision levying a 10 per cent tax on yachts and other pleasure boats selling for more than \$15.

All of the House provisions relative to men and women's wearing apparel were accepted unchanged. Under this schedule, men, women and boys will be permitted to pay \$5 for suits or overcoats without being subject to tax while women's dresses costing less than \$40 will be exempted.

The House proposal to tax women's hats costing more than \$15 was accepted, but the provision placing the limitation of \$5 for men's and boys' hats and \$2 for caps was revised so as to make \$6 for the former and \$4 for the latter.

Texas Family Needs 42 Pounds of Sugar. Dallas, Tex., Oct. 18.—There is one Dallas family that is entitled to 42 pounds of sugar a month under the regulation of two pounds per person per month.

Missouri Vegetables, 1918. That Missouri farm vegetables did surprisingly well in the face of a very unfavorable season is shown by Field Agent E. A. Logan and Secretary Jewell Mayes of the U. S. Bureau of Crop Estimates and State Board of Agriculture in joint investigation on vegetable crops.

The Missouri yield of Irish potatoes is 5,920,000 bushels in 1918 against 9,483,000 last year. Sweet potatoes show condition of 73 per cent against 85 last year, indicating 693,000 bushels in 1918 and 896,000 in 1917.

The acreage of potatoes was increased over 1917 but the season was very unfavorable, bugs were bad, and the aphids did great damage. The extreme heat of July and August hit the crop at a critical time in the north portion of the state, while that of the west side south of the river was also damaged.

Sweet potato slips were set in the midst of a severe drought, causing bad stands, followed by dry weather greatly retarding the growth of vines, yet splendid improvement has been made since the rains; lateness of frost has aided maturity.

The acreage of dry beans was much less than last year, but more than the usual year, the condition is 61 per cent of a normal crop against 300 last year, which was the largest production ever known in this state. The crop would have been larger except for drought, farmers having more experience, and with favorable seasons a better crop would have been made than last year; also better seed was used.

Tomatoes were 58 per cent of normal against 93 last year. After the rains, the crop made great improvement in the southwest section where the canning crop is raised, but continued wet and cool weather fostered rotting and prevented ripening, lessening the production. Cabbages, 52 per cent of a full crop against 93 last year, also suffered from drought. Early cabbage was good but the middle crop was poor; however the late crop was better showing but with heads bursting in some fields. Onions are 77 per cent of full production against 94 last year, largely out of the way early in the season, showing better condition than any other of our vegetable crops.

TO ASK A \$2.46 WHEAT PRICE

Growers Will Say That Present Rate Is Unprofitable.

Washington, Oct. 19.—President Wilson will be urged to fix a minimum price of \$2.46 a bushel for No. 1 Northern wheat or its equivalent, Chicago delivery, by representatives of the National Wheat Growers' Association at a conference Monday.

In a brief to be presented to the President and made public tonight the growers declare that "the 1918 wheat prices barely cover the average cost of production of wheat this year and will be far below the inevitable cost of production of the year 1919 wheat crop."

The wheat growers take exceptions to cost estimates made by the Agricultural Department, declaring that in computing them the department considered only the acreage harvested and not the acreage planted to winter wheat. It is pointed out that 31 per cent of the winter wheat planted in 1916 was abandoned while of the acreage planted last fall more than 13 per cent was abandoned.

Declaring labor now receives from four to six times the pre-war scale, the brief says, "It is only logical that the price of wheat should increase at least proportionately."

The Scullys Having Trouble With Their Illinois Tenants. Morris, Ill., Oct. 9.—Farmer tenants in this vicinity of the William Scully estate of England, which recently raised rent from \$6 to \$10 an acre, resolved in mass meeting last night not to pay the increase.

They hired a lawyer to appeal to the courts and the Food Administration. They say if the advance is insisted on they will not plant fall crops.

The Scully estate is said to own 150,000 acres in Illinois and big tracts in the South.

Some time ago the Scully tenants in this county received notice that their rent would be raised for the coming year. Many of them were dissatisfied and claimed that they could not make enough to pay the increase. A mass meeting of the tenants was called to meet in this city and make an organized protest but nothing came of it.

The tenants in this county are compelled to own all of the improvements on the farms that they occupy and when they might desire to give up their lease they must find a buyer for these improvements or else abandon them and lose all that they have invested, as it would be a losing proposition to try and move the improvements from one farm to another. This is rather an un-American arrangement, but up to the present it has caused but little dissatisfaction. The Scullys own somewhere in the neighborhood of 40,000 acres of Bates county land, a large part of which was bought about 20 years ago when land was much cheaper than at present, and as they have no capital invested in improvements they are able to rent their land at a figure lower than the average landlord, who must own and keep up a lot of expensive improvements.

Evidence of Incendiarism in Forest Fires Obtained. St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 19.—State and Government officials are investigating suspicious incidents connected with the recent forest fires which swept Minnesota, it was learned upon good authority at the State capitol today. It is understood that the investigations are to determine whether incendiaries actually started the fires or took advantage of natural conditions to spread the flames.

It has been reported that many evidences of incendiarism have been obtained by forest wardens, home guardsmen and volunteer workers.

New York Barbers Must Wear Masks. New York, Oct. 19.—Mayor Frank Hague has ordered that for the duration of the influenza epidemic barbers wear masks while cutting hair and shaving. Two hundred masks manufactured by the Women's club of the city will be distributed to the barbers today.
