

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION.

The St. Louis Republican gives the following table, and remarks. As the election draws nigh, politicians begin to make their calculations as to the result. There is a wide difference between the estimates of the two parties, and one or the other is destined to be sorely disappointed. We feel confident of Gen. Taylor's success, even by a larger vote than the Republican's calculation.

The whole number of Electoral votes is 290—necessary to a choice, 146. We set down the following States as almost certain to vote for Taylor, and if they do he will be elected. We give to Gen. Cass, but only for the purpose of this table, every doubtful State; and giving him these, and New Jersey besides, Taylor will still be elected. We divide the States thus:

In the above table, we have claimed no States for Gen. Taylor which there is not a reasonable certainty, and general belief, that he will carry; and merely for the illustration, we have given General Cass all the other States, and with them all, he lacks nine votes of being elected. If he should get New Jersey, (which he has no more chance of than any other genuine Whig state,) still he would lack two votes of being elected.

We do not wish to be understood, by any means, as conceding to Cass all the States we have set down to him. We do not do it. There is Virginia, Georgia, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin and Iowa, which we regard as by no means certain. In Georgia, Ohio, Wisconsin and Iowa, we believe Taylor's prospects are more favorable than those of Gen. Cass. So far as we are able to judge from all the elements of information in our reach, we cannot find a reason to induce the belief that they will not vote for Taylor. Of the election of the Old Patriot we have every confidence, and the only question is the extent of his majority.

All this but the opinion of one man, and his impressions are entitled to no more weight than those of any other voter. We expect our friends to form their own opinions, independent of our views, and with such lights as are accessible to them. We know our opponents will do so.

WHO DOES HE BELONG TO? This question with regard to Gen. Taylor, may very properly be asked; but the difficulty will be in finding a satisfactory answer.—Banner.

No difficulty at all, Captain. Gen. Taylor belongs to the people of these United States; he has served them long, faithfully, patriotically—and they appreciate the services of their old servant, and are preparing a seat for him in the "upper row."—Witness the recent elections.
