## MILWAUKEE MEN ARRESTED.

Accused of Obtaining County Orders Under False Pretenses.

Milwaukee, Jan. 30.—Four supervisors, Edward Strauss, Julius Feige, August Puls and Joseph J. Galewski, and Peter J. Meade, a private citizen, were arrested last evening on indictments returned by the grand jury Wednesday night. The supervisors are charged with obtaining county orders under false pretenses, and Mead with perjury.

A sixth arrest was that of William Stoffel, a private citizen charged with perjury.

Several additional indictments were returned last night but the names are kept secret until arrests are made.
