OFFICIALS TAKE A TRIP

Officials of M. & I. and North-
ern Pacific Going Through
to Boundary.

TRIP REGARDED AS SIGNIFICANT
AT THIS TIME.

May Mean the Extension of the
M. & I. to Koochiching Before
Another Year.

General Manager W. H. Gem-
mell, of the Minnesota & Inter-
national Railway company, Act-
ing Chief Engineer Pearson and
Land Commissioner Wilsey, of
the Northern Pacific, left this
morning on an exploration trip
through the territory between
the present terminus of the Min-
nesota & International at North-
ome and the international bound-
ary line. They expect to be gone
about a week or ten days.

Just at this time when there is
so much talk about the M. & I.
pushing its road connection
through to the boundary line, this
trip seems significant and would
indicate that there is some founda-
tion to the rumors afloat that
before another year the line will
have been completed to some
point along the Canadian Pacific.

The stretch of country from
Northome to the boundary will be
traversed by the gentlemen with
team, and they expect to spend
some time looking over the route.
It is said that there is a wide area
of country north that will some
day be included in the best agri-
cultural lands of the state. At
present much of this land is in-
cluded in what is known as the
"Big swamp," but with proper
drainage the same will be con-
verted into rich agricultural re-
gions as the soil is rich and of ex-
cellent quality.

The completion of this line
through to the boundary would
make the M. & I. one of the most
important lines of railroad in the
northwest and would open up an
entirely new route to the Cana-
dian northwest, the shortest direct
line to the Twin Cities and the
east. There would not be any
doubt but that through trains
would be run from the Twin Cities
to connect with the Canadian
Pacific, and this would make a
very short run to Winnipeg as
compared with the present
schedule.
