Board of Health Taboos Much of Bemidji's Water Supply.

WELLS IS PRESENT.

Impure Water a Source of Contagion to Be Avoided at This Season.

Don't drink city water. If you drink water at all be sure that it comes from a good well, free from the possibility of surface water or the taint of other impurities. This is the advice of the local health authorities to the general public.

Bemidji water is probably neither better nor worse than the water of many cities in this section of the country, but in view of the fact that samples of the water sent to the state chemist last fall stand condemned as impure and unfit for drinking pur poses and the danger of contagion from impure water always present at this season of the year the health authorities feel that the advice is timely and will be generally received in the spirit which it is intended.
