SERIOUSLY HURT

Employee of Lang & Carter Seriously Injured at Nary This Morning.

A workman in the employ of Lang & Carter at Nary was seriously and perhaps fatally injured at Nary this morning while digging a well. The man was working at the bottom of a forty foot well and the dirt was being taken out in buckets. One of the loaded buckets fell from the top of the well and struck him. He was rendered unconscious and was believed to be beyond aid when medical attention was summoned from this city shortly before noon. No further details of the accident have been obtainable.
