**Plot to Disrupt Union.**  
 Miners' Official Holds Citizens' Alliance Responsible for Outrage.  
 Denver, June 8.—The News prints the following interview with Vice President Williams of the Western Federation of Miners, who is acting in the capacity of president during Mr. Moyer's imprisonment in the military bull pen at Telluride.  
 "Troubles at Cripple Creek, the riot and disturbances there are simply an attempt to disrupt the union and bring the strike to a close."  
 "It is my candid opinion that the Citizens' alliance—an organization that is and always has been bitterly hostile to the miners—is at the bottom of this attempt to break the strike by a display of violence."  
 "The opinion among the miners is that the Citizens' alliance is an attempt to break the strike by a display of violence."  
 "As for the Citizens' alliance its members are absolutely untrustworthy and pay no attention to law and order."  
 "Our organization is founded on the principles of truth and justice and its members are as much interested in other persons in supporting law and order. Whoever committed the dastardly crime at Independence must be found and punished and we want to put our names on record as helping to bring that about."  
**FEAR TOWN WILL BE BURNED.**  
 Reported That Troops Will Be Ordered to Victor.  
 Denver, June 8.—It is reported in the capital that troops from Co. and Springs and neighboring camps will be ordered to Victor, Colo., to prevent the town from being burned by a mob of miners who are now untrusting and can be expected to burn the Cripple Creek district and other places.  
**NEARLY BURIED ALIVE.**  
 Child Revived After Lying Thirty-six Hours in Her Coffin.  
 Custer, S. D., June 8.—After lying thirty-six hours in her coffin, Mary Fearing, the five-year-old daughter of C. M. Fearing, has been revived. The child was saved through the intervention of Dr. E. S. Norton, a relative who was at the house to attend her funeral. Dr. Norton noted the rosiness and unchanged appearance of the child and refused to permit the coffin to be closed. He called other physicians and an effort was made to revive the child. At last, after several turning operations were made, half an hour later the stethoscope indicated a return of strong heart action. An hour later the child was sitting in the arms of its mother. Proper care the child will soon be an advanced case of convalescence.  
**DEED OF INSANE FATHER.**  
 Kills His Four Children and Then Commits Suicide.  
 Elizabeth, N. J., June 8.—About Ponce, thirteen years old, who was shot by his father, Joseph M. Ponce of Roselle, died in the general hospital here early in the day, making the fourth victim of the maniacal frenzy of the insane father, who shot the boy and his five-year-old sister Minnie just as the police broke into his home and then shot himself in the right temple, dying instantly. The three previous children had foregone their right to the throats of their other two children, Lillian and Mamie, aged respectively seven years and eighteen months, and had added to the work of poison by chocking them, as marks on their throats bore witness.
