**Overreaching Itself.**

The war of extermination now being waged against labor unions in the Cripple Creek district is a direct result of an activity on the part of organized labor that has become unsufferable. Through the indiscretion of leaders whose only hope of occupation is to foment trouble between the employer and the employe labor organizations have in numerous instances become practical highwaymen and murderers. The people of this country cannot endure this sort of thing. The death knell of labor unionism has been sounded in the Cripple Creek district and if labor organizations persist in so far overreaching their rightful powers the same fate will overtake them in other parts of the country.

At the last meeting of the directors of the club there were a number of business men present in addition to the directorate and their presence and counsel helped much in discussion and decision. 
