HEARING IN PROGRESS

Bersvend O. Roen Arraigned For Killing of Ole Bakken.

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER IN FIRST DEGREE.

Iver Iverson and Wife Two Chief Witnesses For State On Stand.

The preliminary hearing of Bersvend O. Roen, for the killing of Ole J. Bakken, is being conducted before Judge Reynolds this afternoon. County Attorney Lund is appearing for the state and E. E. McDonald is up for the accused man.

Roen is charged with manslaughter in the first degree and will be bound over to the grand jury. Quite a crowd is in attendance at the hearing. The two main witnesses for the state are Iver Iverson and wife. Mr. Henderson will testify in his capacity as coroner.

None of Roen's relatives are in attendance at the trial but several of his neighbors and friends are here. The taking of testimony will require until six o'clock at least. The Iversons are on the stand as the Pioneer goes to press and are telling of the fatal fight.

It appears that the case is a very unfortunate one. Both men were beside themselves as the result of excessive drinking. Roen will probably not make application for bail and will remain in jail until the grand jury meets.

MADE 'EM SMILE

The following from today's Minneapolis Journal regarding the hearing of the contesting delegations from this county before the state convention committee on credentials will be interesting. The Collins delegation was finally seated.

McDonald, their spokesman, asserted, "not because Collins was the stronger in the county, but 'cause the Dunn men had got to scarping among themselves." The convention was changed into a "rough house" by the Dunn men when they found they were losing the day. W. A. Gould, the chairman, declared he had pounded a table to pieces with a hammer trying to get order. The Collins element claimed the convention by a vote of 58 to 41. A. H. Pitkin, who was secretary, asserted that he knew attempts were made to "stuff the ballot."
