The County Campaign.

On the twentieth day of September, just two months from today, the primary election will be held and candidates will be placed in nomination for the November election by the different political parties. Owing to the fact that Beltrami county is overwhelmingly republican interest centers principally in the republican candidates. Thanks to the republican party candidates for office are now for the most part nominated as well as elected by the people themselves and the nominations made two months from today will be made by popular vote.

The primary election law was placed upon the statute books that the individual voters might be able to place in nomination the best man for the office and the little experience we have had with the law thus far shows that the people are keen to take advantage of this great reform. Men have been nominated for office, county, legislative, congressional, who could not boast the favor of a corporals guard of politicians; they were chosen for the same reason that a business man hires his assistants—because they were fitted for the position, not because some politician placed their names upon the party ticket.

The primary campaign for the nomination of county officers in Beltrami county is now well under way. The people of the county have the power to nominate men who are qualified to fill the various offices and we believe that it is this idea which will influence four out of every five voters as they go to the nominating polls September 20th.

Any citizen in the county has the right to offer himself as a candidate for the nomination to any office. But he must render the people of the county reasons why he should be chosen—be must show experience, or peculiar ability, and it is far better if he can show both, together with a record for every day honesty. This showing together with a genial personality will get many votes and the people are looking for such men.

The Pioneer will support no man for nomination unless he can show that by reason of experience, ability and integrity he is better fitted for the position to which he aspires than any of the other candidates for that position. Where this cannot be clearly shown we believe that each man should be left to present his own case to the voters of the county.

May the best men win.

AMUSEMENTS

The appearance of a minstrel organization is now so rare a theatrical event, that by striking contrast with the past it forcibly recalls to all the old theater goers the time when similar troupes were counted by the tens, where now they figure only in the units. The burnt cork artist is distinctly an American product, and with more or less prominence has been before the public for three quarters of a century. As early as 1815 negro impersonations were given in connection with melo-drama, but it was not until 1843 that special minstrel troupes were organized, the first consisting of that famous quartette, Dan Emmett, (the author of Dixie) Frank Brower, Billy Whitlock and Dick Pelhan, who gave their initial performance—the first regular minstrel performance ever given in the world, on February 17, that year. Since this date the passage of the years have witnessed hundreds if not thousands of similar organizations, and this branch of the dramatic art has raised into national and in some instances international renown such well remembered names as Dan Emmett, Charley White, George Christy, Eph Horn, Nelse Seymour, Billy Burch, Billy Backus, Ben Cotton, Bob Hart, Ben Gardner, Luke Schoolcraft, Stephen Foster, Gus Howard, Billy Gray, Bob Slavin, Tony Hart, Lew Benedict, Billy Arlington, Cal Wagner, and Clarence Powell, the latter now the bright particular star with Richards & Pringle's Famous Georgia Minstrels who will appear at the Opera House this evening.
