

To Better State High Schools

Minnesota is justly proud of its high school system. It has legislated that much money to secure the results which are attracting the attention of educators throughout the country. The chiefest factor in making the state high schools of Minnesota the success that they are has been the state school board, a body with wide powers and liberal funds for distribution to the schools which have met a certain standard. The tendency has been however to make the high schools a place of training for the university and the state educational association has taken up the matter of reform in this respect. The high schools should at the same time they prepare boys and girls for college prepare them for active life if they cannot afford a college education. A meeting of a special committee appointed by the state educational association to investigate this matter will be held at the state capital next Tuesday, the question will be carefully studied and plans formulated to effect the needed reform. It cannot be accomplished in a day, but the beginning is praiseworthy.

Clean Politics.

There seems to be a disposition in some quarters to throw dirt in the preprimary campaign in Beltrami county. The Pioneer is glad to know that such unseemly conduct cannot be charged to the candidates themselves and regrets that any newspaper would stoop to such littleness. We have put the primary law upon the statute book in order that we might all have an equal voice in the nomination of the men who are to run for office. The Pioneer is persuaded that the great majority of the people of Beltrami county desire the nomination and election of the men who are best qualified to fill the respective positions to which they aspire. This is the test which the candidate must undergo. If he has served the county before, his record for efficiency must be clear and the man who has demonstrated his capacity and fidelity is the man for the people to employ for the future if we can get him. The man or the newspaper which has to throw mud in order to secure what it wants is pretty sure to want something they ought not to have.

THERE are a good many of us who do not appreciate what a great state Minnesota really is. The state fair, which has come to be a great exposition, will do much to help us out in this respect. The educational advantages of the Minnesota state fair are not surpassed by any fair held within the boundaries of the union.

POLITICS

Mr. Jinkinson has been urged to run for sheriff of Beltrami county but intimated to the Enterprise man that he was much more likely to enter the lists for county treasurer.
