Brainerd now claims the amateur championship of Minnesota on the strength of defeating Bemidji, but local fans are willing to back the Bemidji team at any old stage of the game against the aggregation down the line. Manager Barker is trying for a game between the two teams to be played here next Sunday, and if this is secured Brainerd will have a chance to prove their superiority.

In the game played between Bemidji and Aitkin yesterday the score stood seventeen to three in favor of Bemidji at the end of the ninth inning. This is a signal victory for Bemidji, as the Aitkin team has claimed the championship of northern Minnesota. The plan of the local management was to play Aitkin next Sunday, but in view of the poor showing they made on their home grounds, the Brainerd team will be secured if possible.

The two new players from Fosston seem to have made good in the local team in the games at Brainerd. Stillman, who plays center, got four put-outs in Sunday's game, some of which were almost impossible chances, and made a three base hit. Hampson played excellent first and made two hits, one of which was a double.

Bongo, the clever third baseman for Bemidji, did excellent work in the Sunday game at Brainerd. He did good work with the stick, securing two 2-baggers.
