Fifteen Hundred Dollars Reward

J. J. Regan has made perhaps the most exhaustive canvass of the county in his campaign for county superintendent of schools that has been made thus far. There are few people in the county that Mr. Regan has not seen and there are very few sec-



tions in which he has not secured earnest support. Mr. Regan is in every way qualified to fill the office, having taught in rural and village schools for many years and being one of the pioneer teachers of Beltrami county. He is an energetic, capable man and if nominated and elected would give the office of superintendent of schools a vigorous administration. Mr. Regan is from the western part of the county which has little representation among the county officers.

John Gibbons has just returned from a short campaign tour and is much pleased with the encouragement his candidacy for county attorney is receiving. Mr. Gibbons does not believe that he will receive all the votes but is confident that his support is sufficiently strong to insure him the nomination.

Bemidji, Minn., July 23, 1904.
 Board of County Commissioners met as per adjournment. All members present.

On motion, The Board adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock p. m.

Board reconvened as per adjournment and on motion, adjourned to 2 o'clock p. m. in July 24 to give the Board of Equalization time to complete its work.

July 23, 1904.
 Board reconvened as per adjournment. All members present except A. O. Johnson.

On motion, \$20 was appropriated out of the county road and bridge fund to the town of Blackduck and bridge fund to the town of Hornet to be expended on county road as it runs over section 28 of said town for covering roadway.

On motion, \$300 was appropriated out of the county road and bridge fund to the town of Hornet, \$50 of which money to be expended on range line between said town and the town of Blackduck and bridge fund to the town of Hornet to be expended on range line between said town and the town of Langor.

On motion, the bond of the Beltrami County Bank for deposit of county funds in the sum of \$10,000 with Joseph J. Conger, Seth E. Thompson, William M. Vail, James O. Harris, Charles E. Carter and William McCuaig as sureties was approved and accepted.
