### Rah For Roosevelt!

It might just as well be war as anything else.

Representatives of the Standard Oil company and the United States Steel trust have notified the president that they will fight him to the death in the present campaign if he does not withhold his hand from prosecuting their illegal corporations. At the same time they offered President Roosevelt the bribe of their support if he would desist. The reply was worthy of a president of the United States. "War or no war," said the president, "I will be no weakling. The law shall be no byword with me." Whereupon the representative of two great trusts shook the dust of the White House from his feet and departed in mighty wrath.

It seems to be the people against Wall street and the trusts in this campaign.

It is hardly to be expected that a heavy vote will be cast in Beltrami county at the primary election September 20. Hundreds of residents and voters are out of the county, many of them in the harvest fields of the Red river valley. Past experience with the law also shows that the people in the country do not turn out well. Should the weather prove unfavorable the vote will be very light indeed. The object of the law is to give the people the opportunity of nominating their candidates, but here is a weakness of the law that threatens to defeat its very intent.

The recent opening of reservation lands in North Dakota is proving very unsatisfactory. It has been discovered that the lands offered are very inferior to those which may be obtained on this side of the Red River of the North, and more than half of the six hundred who obtained allotments will neglect to exercise their right to file. When you want the real thing come over into Minnesota.

SOME Twin City papers are sorely scandalized because a good many democrats are going to work and vote for Bob Dunn for governor. This is exceedingly naughty, say the T. C. papers, but it is nothing compared to the depravity of R. C. Dunn in soliciting the support of democrats. Mr. Dunn is horrid, nasty man, and it is no wonder the T. C. papers are shocked.

The candidate for office who has to run down his opponent, call names, ask for support because he is a Swede or an Irishman does so because he has no better reason to offer for his election, and a candidate who has no better qualifications than these is a mighty poor man to serve the public in any official capacity whatever.

### Articles of Incorporation

—of the—

### Bemidji Elevator Company.

Know all men by these presents, that we, the undersigned, have associated ourselves together to form a corporation for the purpose hereinafter mentioned, pursuant to the provisions of Title 2, Chapter 54, General Statutes of Minnesota, and for that purpose have agreed upon and adopted the following

#### ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

ARTICLE 1.  
The name of this corporation shall be "The Bemidji Elevator Company." The principal nature of its business shall be to build, buy, sell, mortgage, lease, own and operate elevators; buy and sell grain, flour, produce, coal, grind grain and manufacture flour and feed and other commodities for themselves and for others on commission and carry on a general merchandising and commission business.

ARTICLE 2.  
The principal place of business of this corporation shall be at Bemidji, in the county of Beltrami and state of Minnesota, but said corporation may have an office, or transact business at any other place or places in the state of Minnesota, or elsewhere.

ARTICLE 3.  
The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be September 14th, 1904, and the period of its continuance shall be 20 years.

ARTICLE 4.  
The amount of capital stock of said corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000), which shall be divided into one hundred shares of One Hundred (100) Dollars each, to be paid in cash, or property, or both, as may be determined by the board of directors.

ARTICLE 5.  
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time be subject is Ten Thousand Dollars.

ARTICLE 6.  
The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are as follows:  
E. H. Smith, of Duluth, Minn.  
L. E. Meyer, of Duluth, Minn.  
G. F. Smith, of Duluth, Minn.

ARTICLE 7.  
The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a board of directors, consisting of not less than three, from whom may be selected the officers of the corporation, the president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer.  
Said corporation may adopt and be governed by such by-laws as are not inconsistent with the laws of the state of Minnesota.
