State Game is Far Famed.

Hundreds of hunters come to Minnesota annually for their yearly outing and the advertisement and the profit which Minnesota gets from them is far more considerable than is generally supposed. Minnesota game is far famed and the number of people that it brings each year to the state is well illustrated by a remark made by a railroad man the other day. "Although tourist travel into Minnesota is about over," he declared, "we look for no falling off in passenger traffic. We expect an increase in fact for the hunting season has just commenced." If Minnesota game attracts hunters to the outnumbering of tourists, it is certainly a very remarkable asset to the state and we should do everything in our power to enforce the game laws so that the annual hegira of hunters to Minnesota may continue for all time to come.

There was a time, not many years since, when hunting parties from the east were much more frequent than they are today. But the ruthless slaughter of game has made hunting harder and many whom we used to see now come no more. Minnesota cannot afford to lose its attraction to the hunter and wearinessly hope that the state may be a famous hunting ground for many years to come.

Nominations Grow Nearer.

Primary election day is but a week away.

The primary election law is yet a new thing in Minnesota although this is its second trial. It was placed upon the statute books in response to a demand that the nomination of candidates be taken from the politicians and given back to the people. At the first trial of the law a large proportion of the people however did not appreciate the opportunity within their grasp—they remained away from the polls, and most candidates were nominated by a minority vote.

If the primary law is to be of any benefit to us we must use it. Every voter should cast his ballot next Tuesday for the candidates he thinks best fitted for the respective offices. The primary election next Tuesday is more important by far in Beltrami county than the general election in November.

Let us have a full vote.

JUST before the state republican convention the state public examiner volleyed and thundered at a great rate with his reports against Robert C. Dunn. Two months and a half have passed since the convention and not a sound can the people get out of him. If Mr. Johnson knows such bad things about Mr. Dunn why does he not tell the people about them.
