Sisters of St. Benedict Getting Hospital in Shape For Usual Winter Rush.

The Sisters of St. Benedict, who own and conduct St. Anthony's hospital in this city, are busy now days getting the hospital in shape for the accommodation of a large number of patients during the winter months. Sixteen patients are now confined in the hospital, and this is considered a very small number when compared with the large number of cases during the logging season. The hospital has a capacity of about 75, but the average in the winter time is about 50. A number of the wards are wholly unoccupied at the present time but it is likely that these will be filled with injured woodsmen this winter.
