

## DIS'T COURT ADJOURNS

After Four Weeks of Continuous Work Court Adjourns to Nov. 1.

BOTH CIVIL AND CRIMINAL CALENDARS WERE LARGE.

Another Week Will Be Spent In Trying a Number of Minor Civil Cases.

The October term of district court, which has been in session in this city for the past four weeks, was adjourned this morning until November 1, when a number of minor court cases will be tried by Judge Spooner. All the jury cases have been tried and it only remains for the court to try a few civil cases for the calendar to be exhausted.

The term which has just adjourned was the longest in the history of the county and in point of the number of grave criminal cases was the most important. Three men were charged with murder in the first degree, one manslaughter and another for assault with intent to kill, but only one conviction was secured. The civil calendar was also very large and some important matters were disposed of at the present term.

For the past week it was necessary for Judge McClenahan to be present and a number of civil cases were disposed of by him.

## HE SERVED WITH CODY

Chas. Mossey, Now in City, Was With Famous "Buffalo Bill" Company.

FOUGHT INDIANS IN MEXICO WITH RENOWNED LEADER.

Is One of Best Rifle Shots In United States and Shoots With Unerring Precision.

Charles Mossey, better known as "Scar Faced Charley," who was a member of the famous Indian fighting company of which Wm. F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) was leader, arrived in the city last night and will remain here for some time.

Mr. Mossey related a number of his experiences while a member of the squad of scouts who did so much to quell the Indian disturbances in the West, and the stories he told about the many fights in which he was engaged would take up hundreds of pages of the ordinary story book and would make interesting reading matter.

He served under Cody for a number of years as a scout and during the time he was engaged in the service became one of the expert rifle and revolver shots of the country, and although he is almost fifty years of age can hold his own with the best of them yet.

He has traveled through nearly every state in the west and has had experiences with every tribe of Indians that inhabit that section of the country. He was at one time the active chief of the Navajees, who live on the plains of New Mexico and Arizona, and had adventures galore with the Apaches and other southern tribes.

## SURVEYING IN PROGRESS

M. D. Stoner and Crew of Men at Work on Line for New Red Lake Railway.

SURVEY WILL BE COMPLETED IN FEW DAYS.

Contractor Wardenhoff Going Over Line With a View of Taking Contract.

M. D. Stoner, who is at present in charge of a crew of men who are working on the survey for the new Red Lake railway, came into the city Saturday night and remained here until yesterday morning. Mr. Stoner reports that satisfactory progress is being made on the survey and although the country between Bemidji and Buena Vista is hilly believes that a line satisfactory to the railway company will be found.

At the present time the surveying crew is working about ten miles north of this city and coming this way. The line was started from a point on Mud lake from an old survey which was made some time ago and which the company has decided to accept.

From present indications according to Mr. Stoner, the survey will be completed by the end of the week and all that will be necessary then will be the acceptance of the line by the company for work to be begun on clearing the right of way.

Contractor Wardenhoff of St. Paul, who was associated with the firm of Foley Bros. at the time of the extension of the Minnesota & International from Blackduck to Northome, arrived in the city Saturday and left with Mr. Stoner yesterday to look over the line with a view of presenting a bid for the building of the road.
