Mentor Murder One of The Worst in History of Northern Minnesota.

THE MURDERED MAN WAS TERRIBLY MUTILATED.

Claimed That The Murderer, Guillette, Was Seen at Fertile Yesterday.

As the details of the murder of a man supposed to be Albert Derusha one mile this side of Mentor come to light, the crime shows up in the light of the most bloody, brutal fiendish ever recorded in northern Minnesota. From latest investigating the additional details are as follows:

Derusha, and the murderer, whose name is Pete Guillette had been in the vicinity of Mentor for several days. Friday night the two men staid at the LaPage farm and started hunting Saturday morning.

That day no one seems to know where they went but they were seen in Mentor Sunday and ate at the restaurant, the employees of which positively identified Derusha as did LaPage. Sunday night they staid over night at a farm house near town and again started out hunting.

Monday afternoon the two men were seen passing along on the railroad track by several members of the Mareaux family who were picking up potatoes not more than four blocks from the track and not more than five or six from where the murder occurred. A few minutes after they passed the Mareaux family heard a shot and 10 minutes later a second shot, but were not surprised as at this season of the year shooting is general.

Derusha was shot beside the railroad track, the first shot taking effect just behind the car and tearing its way through the back of the head and coming out on the other side. The murderer then took his victim by the heels, flopped him over dragging him face downward down the track over the uneven railroad ties, later rolling the remains down an embankment and dragging them into the brush along the track.

The remains were hideously mutilated as the result of their having been dragged over the rough ties and gravel. The body was disfigured horribly and bore no resemblance to a human being.

After the body had been dragged to the brush Guillette to make his work sure fired another shot full into Derusha's face and held the gun so close that the gun wads were buried in the dirt on either side of the remains about an inch deep.

Eight deputy sheriffs are scouring the country for the fiend in
