of Cass Lake will build a new
sewer, to connect with the new
public school building which is in
course of erection here. The
contract was awarded at a meeting
of the village council held on
Wednesday evening, when bids
according to plans and specifica-
tions drawn by M. D. Stoner, of
Bemidji, engineer for the village.
Bids were submitted by three
different concerns, viz: Chas. E.
Battles, of Cass Lake; Jerrard
Plumbing Co., of Bemidji, and O.
F. Doyle, of St. Cloud. The con-
tract was awarded to Mr. Battles,
the local contractor, whose bid
was \$25 lower than his nearest
competitor, Mr. Doyle.
