PRIDE OF WALKER

Big Sanatorium for Consumptives To Be One Large Building.

COTTAGE PLAN PROVED TO BE TOO EXPENSIVE.

Seven Hundred Acres of Land Have Been Purchased For The Institution.

The cottage plan proposed for the construction of the sanatorium for consumptives, to be erected on the site recently selected by the commission of physicians appointed by the governor, has been abandoned as too expensive, and instead of a number of small cottages one large building will be erected.

As originally proposed, the institution would have consisted of half a dozen cottages located on a wooded site of 700 acres, recently purchased on the banks of Leech lake, near Walker. Present plans call for a large building, three or four stories high, capable of accomodating between 200 and 300 patients at one time. The building will be erected on a high ridge, 200 feet above the level of the lake—which is itself 1,320 feet above the level of the sea—in the midst of a grove of pine trees. These conditions are conceded to be ideal for the treatment of consumptive patients.

An appropriation of \$100,000 was requested for the construction of the institution from the last legislature, but only \$25,000 was allowed. Of this sum the commission has expended \$8,000 for the purchase of a site of 700 acres and several thousand dollars will be expended shortly for clearing away the underbrush on the site and for the removal of timber from the site selected for the building to be erected. It is the intention of the commission to ask the legislature this winter for an additional appropriation of \$75,000 to carry the work to completion.

Close of Lake Season.

The lake season is now practically ended. Capt. McLaughlin still has the Moose in commission, however, hauling wood from the head of the lake, but the boat will be put in dry dock for the season within two weeks.

Have a Band.

Bemidji will have a first class band if the efforts of W. B. McLaughlin can accomplish it. Any attempt to organize a good band will meet with the hearty co-operation of the business men of the city and it is to be hoped that before the winter is over a band will be organized on a permanent business basis.
