Friends of the judge have noticed that he has been growing to appear more sickly every day, and it is said that the necessity for his removal to a warmer climate is imperative.

MURDER THEORY DISCREDITED

MINNESOTA THE CHAMPION

Unfinished Report of Minnesota--Northwestern Foot Ball Game is Given.

Chicago, Ill., Marshall Field, Nov. 19.—At 1:45 the Minnesota football band appeared upon the field and were greeted by thousands of Minnesotans. The Northwestern band also appeared and both bands were loudly cheered. The weather is clear and warm—almost too warm for football. The Minnesota team appeared on the field and were loudly cheered. The Northwestern team has not yet arrived. The line-up of the two teams will be as follows:

Northwestern—Davidson, left end; Kaper, left guard; Ward, left tackle; Davis, center; Carlson, right guard; Allen, right tackle; Williamson, right end; Johnson, quarter; Van Ryper, left half back; Reuber, right half back; Blair, fullback. Captain Strathern will not play because of being barred from the game.

Minnesota—Burgan, right end; Brush, right tackle; Smith, right guard; Ricker, center; Thorpe, left guard; Case, left tackle; Marshall, left end; Kremer, right half back; Davies, left half back; Curren, fullback.

Northwestern won the toss and Minnesota kicks off to Northwestern's 20 yard line. The ball was called back and Kramer kicked off to Northwestern's 35 yard line. On the first down Blair made a 25 yard run around right end. Minnesota was penalized 5 yards for an offside play. With the ball in Northwestern's possession, on the first down, three yards to gain, Northwestern failed to gain and Minnesota got the ball on the center of the field. Minnesota gained 5 yards on both the first and second downs. The ball was on the 50 yard line and Minnesota had 3 yards to gain. Harris punted to Minnesota's 5 yard line and out of bounds.

Northwestern got the ball and failed to gain in the first down. In the second down with five yards to gain by Northwestern Minnesota was penalized 5 yards for an offside play, leaving the ball on their 15 yard line. Johnson failed to gain around right end, Blair punts to Harris in the middle of the field and the ball is out of bounds in Minnesota's possession on their 5 yard line. On the first down, 5 yards to gain, Case is injured and the ball is in the center of the field. Thorpe makes 2 yards but Harris fails to gain around right end. Davis makes 3 yards and in the third down with 4 yards to gain Harris punts to Johnson on the Northwestern team, who returns the ball 7 yards, leaving it on their 20 yard line.

In the first down with five yards to gain, Harris goes through center for three yards and in the second Kremer drops Johnson in his tracks. Blair punts to Minnesota's 25 yard line and Minnesota gets the ball. Brush makes three yards and then two more, and in the second down with two yards to gain Harris makes the first down leaving the ball on Minnesota's 35 yard line. Case fails to gain. In the third down with 6 yards to gain and the ball on the 35 yard line, Burgan makes 4 yards, Harris drops back and kicks to Reuber on Northwestern's 45 yard line and he returns the ball 7 yards, leaving it on the 47 yard line in Northwestern's possession. In the first down with five yards to gain, Northwestern failed to gain and in the second with 5 to gain Johnson failed.

Blair in the third down punted 60 yards over Minnesota's line for a touchback and Harris kicks to Northwestern on the center of the field. Northwestern returns the ball 15 yards and the ball is on the 40 yard line. First down, five yards to gain. Blair has outpunted Harris 20 yards to each kick. Blair makes a yard through center and leaves the second down with four yards to gain. Allen makes the first down and the ball is on the 35 yard line. Marshall makes 5 more through center and in the first down, Allen makes 3 more. Second down, 2 yards to gain. Allen makes first down, and the ball is on the 25 yard line. Johnson is thrown for a 10 yard loss but Minnesota is offside.

Reuber tries a place kick from the 4 yard line which was blocked by Smith, and the ball was left in Minnesota's possession in the center of the field. First down, 5 yards to gain, Harris fails. Second down, 4 yards to gain, Case fails. Third down, Harris punts 35 yards to Johnson, who fumbles the ball and Kremer picked it up and ran across Northwestern's goal for a touchdown which was disputed and the umpire called back the ball. The officials claim that Minnesota was offside on the kick. The ball is now on the 54 yard line and Minnesota is penalized 5 yards. Minnesota is given the ball on her own 50 yard line.

In the third down with 5 yards to gain, Harris punts 40 yards to Johnson, who returns the ball 10

yards, leaving it on the 35 yard line. First down, 5 yards to gain Blair gains 2 yards. Second down, 3 yards to gain, Allen gains a yard through center and Blair punts to Harris on Minnesota's 25 yard line, who returns the ball to the 43 yard line, leaving the ball in Minnesota's possession on her 43 yard line. Current was injured but stayed in the game. First down, 5 yards to gain, Minnesota makes 3 yards. Second down, 2 yards to gain, Smith makes 8 yards through center. First down, 5 yards to gain and the ball on Northwestern's 53 yard line. Brush makes 3 yards and in the second down with 3 yards to gain the ball is left on the center of the field. Brush makes 2 yards more. Third down, 1 yard to gain.

First down, 5 yards to gain, and the ball on the 53 yard line. Brush makes 3 yards through center and in the second down another yard. Third down, 1 yard to gain, Kremer makes 3 yards around right end. Second down, two yards to gain and the ball still in Northwestern's possession. Brush failed but in the third down made 4 yards leaving the ball on the 44 yard line. Smith makes a yard around right end and the ball is on the 43 yard line. Smith goes through center for 3 yards. Third down, 2 yards to gain. Minnesota loses the ball on downs on Northwestern's 37 yard line. On the first down and the ball in Northwestern's possession, Blair punts to Harris on Minnesota's 25 yard line and Harris is downed in his tracks, leaving the ball in Minnesota's hands on her 25 yard line. First down, 5 yards to gain, Davis makes 5 yards around right end. First down, ball on 31 yard line, Case fails to gain but makes 5 yards through center and then two more. Second down, 3 yards to gain and the ball on the 35 yard line.

Case makes 5 yards around right end. First down, 5 yards to gain, and the ball on the 40 yard line. Smith makes 3 yards through center, leaving the ball on the 43 yard line. Harris makes the first down around right end and the ball is on the Minnesota's 45 yard line. Kremer makes 3 yards through center. Second down, 2 yards to gain. Smith failed gain through center. Third down, 1 yard to gain, Minnesota failed to gain and the ball went to Northwestern on Minnesota's 50 yard line. Second down, Smith gained 8 yards through center and the ball is on Northwestern's 46 yard line.

First down, 5 yards to gain, Kremer makes 3 yards around right end and the ball is on Northwestern's 37 yard line. Second down, 1 yard to gain, Harris makes 8 yards around right end. First down, 5 yards to gain. Brush failed to gain. Second down, 5 yards to gain. Smith makes 5 yards through center in third down, then makes first down putting the ball on Northwestern's 30 yard line. Smith makes 3 yards through center. First down, 5 yards to gain, Smith carries it within a few feet of the goal and all that is necessary to make is the goal. Smith goes over for a touch down. Harris fails to kick goal. Score, Minnesota 5, Northwestern 0.

The game not finished. Score so far, Minnesota 16, Northwestern 0.


FIFTY MILES THROUGH SWAMP
