that a preliminary survey of the
logging operations in the north-
ern pine field shows that the
work is to be carried on in a very
extensive scale during the season
of 1904-5, notwithstanding the
delay at the beginning of the
work, due to wet weather. The
correspondents of the publica-
tion from the various white pine
centers have reported prepara-
tions for logging operations
which have in view the cutting of
1,750,000,000 feet of pine timber.
