No Lobby Needed.

THE secretary of the state drainage league frankly announces that his purpose in soliciting money up and down the state on the plea of the needs of the state in the way of drainage, is to put a part of such moneys into his own pocket and the balance into a lobby to be maintained at Washington to induce congress to appropriate money to drain the reservation lands in the state.

The Cass Lake Times in an able editorial denounces any attempt to maintain a lobby at Washington for this purpose and justly remarks that this 'is a matter which our senators and representatives ought to be able to attend to without the help of a paid lobby. The Duluth Herald, in a recent editorial, also enlarges upon the fact that such a lobby is entirely unnecessary.

The state drainage league of course needs money but not for any such purpose. The chief good which will result from the state drainage league is the continued agitation of the matter of drainage. The meeting of the league at Crookston was worth more to the cause of drainage than all the money that can be raised by the league. It created an interest in, and an enthusiasm for drainage, whose value cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

THE REPORT of County Superintendent Regan shows that the schools of Beltrami county are making headway. Nine substantial new school houses were built last year and the average number of months of school maintained is gradually increasing.

CANNOT BE LOCATED.

Woman Indicted for Attempting to Blackmail Governor Herrick.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—Efforts were made by the Chicago police during the day to find Mrs. Marie Ivers Lawrence, alias Minnie Lee, who was indicted by the grand jury in Cleveland on a charge of attempting to blackmail Governor Herrick of Ohio. Governor Herrick was one of the witnesses.

All of Mrs. Lawrence's relatives in Chicago denied knowledge of her whereabouts and her former home has been vacated. It is expected regulation papers will be made out and the woman, if found, held pending their arrival.

Cleveland, Sept. 28.—The Cuyahoga county grand jury has returned two indictments against Minnie Lee, alias Ellen Ivers, of Chicago, on the charge of attempting to blackmail Governor Herrick. One indictment charges the woman with verbal attempt at blackmail and the other with committing the offense by writing.

Alexander W. Pond, formerly a well known business man of Chicago, committed suicide at Boston by shooting.

WANT SHORTER WORKDAY.

Concerted Movement of Railroad Employees in That Direction.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—The Tribune says:

Preparations are under way for a concerted movement on the part of the big railroad brotherhoods to secure a reduction of the present working hours for railway employees all over the country. The move already has been discussed in the grand councils of the organization. It is expected that it will assume definite form within the next two months.

The grievance committees of many Western railroads will gather in Chicago in December to discuss desired changes in working conditions. At the same time the schedules governing wages and hours will expire on at least three Western roads—the Northwestern, the Burlington and the St. Paul. According to plans now laid the opportunity will be seized to broach the proposed demands of the employees.

The present hours of work on the railroads range from ten to fourteen, but in no case are they fixed. This is due to the nature of the employment. The brotherhoods, it is said, have no intention of appealing for a limited workday. They have planned rather to seek a general reduction which shall be proportionate in all branches of the railroad service.
