TIGHTENS THE SCREWS

RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT TAKING ENERGETIC MEASURES TO CONTROL SITUATION.

NUMBER OF ARRESTS INCREASING

PRISONS CROWDED TO SUFFOCATION, BUT NOT A SUSPECT IS BEING RELEASED.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 4.—The government is putting on the screws tighter and tighter. War Minister Rudiger has issued an order absolutely prohibiting officers, privates and employes of the ministry of war from participation in any fashion in political societies or attending their meetings and prescribing heavy punishments which will be inflicted without trial.

The use of the telephone between St. Petersburg, Moscow and other points, which has been employed in communications between the revolutionists, has been prohibited to private individuals except by permission of the authorities.

The numbers of arrests are increasing daily and the prisons are so crowded that the Nasha Shins says rooms with air space for fifteen are holding sixty persons. So far as ascertained not one of those arrested during the last three weeks has been released. The same paper says that the news boys, who since the imperial reform manifesto was issued had been crying the most sensational revolutionary news in the streets, have been prohibited from even mentioning the names of the papers they are selling.

TO CRUSH REBELLION.

Rigorous Measures Taken by Authorities at Riga.

Riga, Jan. 4.—Governor General Sollugub is taking rigorous measures to root out the revolutionary element. All persons found on the streets are held up by the troops for arms, while the searching of lodgings continues day and night. Field pieces and quick-firing guns are mounted at strategic points.

The railroad men are persisting in the strike, owing to the refusal of the authorities to release their arrested comrades.

Povrovsk, Russia, Jan. 4.—Two gendarmes who were searching the lodgings of railroad men were stabbed to death during the day.

Pabianice, Russian Poland, Jan. 4.—The prefect of police here was assassinated during the day.

Lodz, Russian Poland, Jan. 4.—About 64,000 men are on strike here.

Must Use Russian Language.

Plonsk, Russian Poland, Jan. 4.—In the surrounding villages, where the authorities are refusing to conduct official correspondence in Russian, the courts have been closed and the taxes are being collected by the military.
