IS EXPECTED TO DIE

President Maxwell of Suspended Brooklyn Bank Cuts Throat.

JUST RELEASED FROM JAIL

Is Under Indictment on Charges of Larceny and Forgery and Suffered Keenly During His Imprisonment While Awaiting Bail.

New York, Nov. 27.—Howard Maxwell, former president of the Borough bank of Brooklyn, attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat with a razor at his home in Brooklyn. He was taken to a hospital and is expected to die. Maxwell was indicted on charges of larceny and forgery.

At the Long Island College hospital, to which Mr. Maxwell was taken, it was said he was in a very serious condition.

Maxwell had been very much depressed ever since his indictment and suffered keenly through his imprisonment in Raymond street jail. Bail




