WASHINGTON SHOWS BIG GAIN

Population of National Capital is 331,069.
Washington, June 24.—The population of the District of Columbia is 331,069, according to the returns of the thirteenth decennial census. The population of the District of Columbia in 1900 was 278,718 and in 1890 230,392. This shows under the census of the current year an increase during the last ten years of 52,351, or 18.8 per cent, while the increase as compared with the preceding decade was 48,326, or 21 per cent.

New York, June 24.—Adele Ritchie, an actress, filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy, enumerating liabilities of \$15,249 and assets of \$250 worth of wearing apparel, for which exemption is claimed. Dry goods firms, jewelers and outfitters are the heaviest creditors.
