ROOSEVELT IS STANDING PAT

Reiterates Doctrines He Expounded in Campaign.

IGNORES RECENT ELECTION

Declares He Is "a Radical, but a Radical Who Earnestly Desires to See a Radical Programme Carried Out by Conservatives"—Governor-Elect Simeon E. Baldwin Absent From the New Haven Banquet.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 15.—Ex-President Roosevelt's first political speech since the recent election was delivered here at a dinner given to him by the New Haven chamber of commerce. Colonel Roosevelt made no reference to the recent elections or to current political subjects. He confined himself to a reiteration of broad political doctrines to which he gave expression many times during his speaking trips of the past summer, saying he was glad to make in Connecticut just such a speech as he had made to former gatherings in the West.

Governor-elect Simeon E. Baldwin's place at the banquet table was vacant. He remained at home, retiring early. There were no developments in Colonel Roosevelt's controversy with Judge Baldwin during the colonel's stay here.

Colonel Roosevelt defined his attitude in politics in these words: "I am a radical, but I am a radical who earnestly desires to see a radical programme carried out by conservatives."

He again declared his faith in efficient regulation of corporations by the federal government, and defended his attitude by asserting that he sought not to controvert the Constitution but to help in bringing about the fulfillment of its purposes.

LIBERALS HAVE GOOD LEAD

Majority of Seventy-seven in House of Commons.

London, Dec. 15.—The steadiness of the electorate, so marked since the polling began, was further emphasized at Wednesday's elections.

The forty-three results show but two changes from the returns of last January. These were in the Ashburton division of Devonshire, where the Unionist candidate, Captain E. F. Morrison-Bell, turned out the Liberal member, C. R. Buxton, and in the West division of Fifehire, where a straight fight between the Labor candidate, W. Adamson, and the sitting Liberal member, J. D. Hope, resulted in a victory for the former. The standing by parties is as follows: Government Coalition—Liberals, 220; Irish Nationalists, 61; Independent Nationalists, 9; Labor members, 38; total, 328.

Opposition—Unionists, 251. Present coalition majority, 77.

INSURANCE RATES TOO HIGH

Witness Tells New York Probers of Large Commissions.

New York, Dec. 15.—Edward J. Tapping of Milwaukee, called as a witness in the inquiry into fire insurance matters by the legislative investigating committee, admitted that many of the rates prevailing are now unfair and too high and that commissions paid to agents in many instances are exorbitant.

He said he knew fire companies that paid from 30 to 45 per cent of all premiums they collected.

WANDERS OFF IN DELIRIUM

Well Known Railroad Contractor Frozen to Death.

Winnipeg, Dec. 15.—The body of Neil Keith, one of the best known railroad contractors in America, who built lines for the principal companies in the West in the last thirty years, was found frozen to death in the hills south of Moose Jaw, Sask., where he wandered six weeks ago while delirious from a fever.

Sixteen Hurt in Trolley Wreck.

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 15.—Mrs. S. W. Stinson of this city was severely injured about the head and fifteen others were bruised and shaken up when a limited train on the Seattle-Tacoma interurban line crashed into a local train at Farrow Siding, thirteen miles southeast of Tacoma. Dense fog is declared responsible for the collision.

Wills \$70,000 to Servants.

New York, Dec. 15.—Stipulating that he "recognized no lines of color, creed or race," George L. Fox, a Brooklyn lawyer, who died recently, left a will distributing \$1,500,000 among friends and charitable institutions. Faithful servants are rewarded with \$70,000. Mr. Fox was unmarried and had no relatives.

Explosion Entombs Five Men.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 15.—An explosion in the Northwestern Improvement company's coal mine at Ravenna, twenty miles southeast of Seattle, entombed five men.

SIX PERISH WHEN LAUNCH OVERTURNS

Occupants Rocked Boat While in Swift Current.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 15.—A special from Marysville says that six men were drowned in the Snohomish river when a closed cabin launch turned turtle. There were seventeen persons aboard. All but six were able to break windows and climb to the upturned keel or reach shore.

The dead are Victor Backman, married; Oscar Backman, his brother; Reinhold Sebes, William Erickson, Victor Berg and Victor Leval.

The men were all employees at the Stimson logging camp. They chartered the launch for a pleasure trip to Everett. Fourteen crowded into the cabin and three mounted the roof.

As the vessel careened in the swift current—the men on the top, in a genial mood, added to the motion by rocking the boat, which suddenly overturned.
