Concerning the Amendments

According to a report from St. Paul yesterday, the seven senator amendment failed of passage at the general election by a big vote. Julius Schmah, secretary of state, said that the cities went solidly against the amendment and that several rural communities showed a big vote against it. Returns on the amendments are meagre but indicate that the good roads amendment was passed by a good vote. Mr. Schmah believes that the vote on increasing the gross earnings tax of the railroads will be close.

The state canvassing board will meet Nov. 26. It is composed of Chief Justice Start, Associate Justice P. E. Brown, Judge P. W. Morrison of Norwood, and Judge Wilbur F. Booth of Minneapolis.

Not Enough Turkey.

Now that Montenegro and Bulgaria have driven the Turks from Europe, the time looks right to get that slice but the powers are having trouble convincing the victorious armies that they have fought sufficiently.
