When a city is about to grant a long term franchise, it is well to take time and not rush the thing through. Fortunately for Bemidji, granting a franchise is a matter of passing an ordinance and one cannot be put through the council in less than four weeks. In addition, it must be held by the mayor and published before it is effective.

An agent of eastern capitalists interested in gas will present a proposition to the council tonight. On the face of it, the proposition is a good one, but the men asking for the franchise are skilled in the business and should be watched carefully.

The Little Falls franchise, on which the proposition to Bemidji is based, does not contain several features which authorities on franchises believe should be insisted upon by the city. The council has time to look into the proposition thoroughly and to see that the city is well protected for the future as well as the present.

Legislative expense is one of the over head costs of the state government and any lessening of the item means a lighter burden for the tax payers.

Fight in the Legislature.

Governor Eberhart last week vetoed the Nolan and Minnette public utility bills and they were repassed over his veto by the house Saturday afternoon. They will come before the senate today.

The fight which was precipitated by the governor's vetoes will go down in Minnesota history. The house had no trouble in mustering sufficient votes to pass the Minnette bill but had some trouble with the Nolan bill. One feature of the fight was the remonstrance meeting against the veto of the Nolan bill held in Minneapolis Saturday night and largely attended. The governor certainly waved a red rag before Minneapolis with his No-

Every person in Minnesota will watch the outcome of the fight. Probably a majority agree with the governor that the state needs a good public utilities bill covering all utilities. The question is-Can the governor force the legislature to act as he wishes?

A Bill for Game Hogs.

A bill has been introduced in the legislature which if passed will allow hunters to kill two antlered deer or moose, or one antlered and one female deer but no female moose during each season. The slaughter of deer and moose is large enough each fall with the present law in effect.

The real hunters would like to see a law passed which will prohibit the killing of female deer as well as female moose. If the game is not conserved, deer and moose will soon follow the buffalo, elk and caribou that once roamed Northern Minnesota. With the present law in force, State Forester Cox estimates that the yearly increase about equals the number killed. With the killing doubled, the days of deer and moose will be numbered.
