Washington, Nov. 5.—Secretary Bryan gave out a statement denying that any ultimatum had been sent to President Huerta. He said:

"No ultimatum has been sent to Mexico and it is unfortunate that the press should give credence to such a report. The harm done by speculation or even inaccuracies with regard to domestic questions is limited be cause the people are acquainted with the subject and can make allowances, but as statements with regard to international matters may lead to serious consequences I feel justified in making the above denial."




