London, Dec. 19.—The Grand Duke Boris of Russia, a cousin of the emperor of Russia, took the witness stand in the lord chief justice's court in order to rebut allegations of misconduct and cowardice brought against him in a magazine article.

In connection with this article he brought suit for libel against the Frank A. Munsey company, but the suit was settled out of court. The grand duke swore in court that there was no foundation for the libel.


The case was then closed, the defendants agreeing to pay all costs.


