Mexican Bank Suspends.

Mexico City, Dec. 23.—The Bank of London and Mexico has closed its doors. The bank has been subjected to severe strain in the demand made upon it for currency and for several days a steady stream of depositors sought to withdraw their money.

WILSON URGES REPRIMAND

Washington, Dec. 23.—President Wilson made public a letter addressed to Secretaries Garrison and Daniels, respectively, requesting that "a very serious reprimand" be administered to those army and navy officers who participated in the recent dinner of the military order of the Carabao, at which the administration's Philippine and other policies were satirized.
