Practical Fashion Hints

Should anyone desire to contest the petitions of the Socialist candidates, filed with the city clerk Saturday, it would probably result in not one of their names being placed on the ballot. Value Seldom Shown On Surface
 The value of an article, sometimes is so plainly visible that no argument is necessary, but this is not a very common case, for practically every article can be made to appear better than it really is, and it is to a large extent due to this fact that so much misrepresentation is practiced by persons who have no other relations with their customers than an occasional sale.

All these items, and many others not visible to the eye, go to make or unmake the quality of the shoes, and the person who is not permanently located where you can get at him often takes advantage of this fact and thus sells you a lower grade than you are induced to think you are buying.

Your local retailer whose living must be made out of his sales to you and your friends—as a plain matter of policy, if for no other reason—must, and does, sell goods which are thoroughly dependable. If something goes wrong with the article you have bought, the local retailer must and does "fix it up" right away. No letter writing, no waiting, no shipping back of the article, no extra expenses, of any kind. All you have to do is to tell him about it and whatever the trouble is it will be settled at once.

The local retailer is always on the spot. When you buy from him you see the article and can examine it thoroughly before you pay for it, in addition to having the benefit of his personal interest in seeing that you get a reliable article. He can explain and answer questions that you may wish to ask before deciding, and as we said before—he is there to make things right if any question comes up after you have bought and used the article.
