"In Marta of the Lowlands," Mme. Then come developments which makes the drama one of the most passionate, intense, trenchant character studies ever created.

Mme. Kalich makes Marta a patient sufferer, a tragic figure indeed, as she bravely endures all the cruelty and indignities that are thrust upon her by the ruthless "master." We witness the poignancy of her grief, the restraint and the anguish of the oppressed woman; we watch her movements among the treacherous characters of her environments; and throughout it all we are overwhelmed by the power of the artist and the appeal of the woman.
