* **NORTHWEST BRIEFS**

Aberdeen, S. D.—The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonry opened its thirty-ninth annual reunion here today.

Minneapolis, Minn.—Less than one per cent of the gigantic grain crop of the Northwest has reached the market. Four million bushels less grain has been marketed thus far this year than at the same time last year. Lumber dealers report an unparalleled demand for cheaper lumber and this, coupled with low grain receipts, grain gamblers say, means that the farmers of the Northwest are holding their grain. That the farmer is prepared to hold his grain until he gets \$1.25 a bushel for it, is a statement often heard.

St. Cloud, Minn.—Though he lived on the property where he was conducting a hotel for nearly 70 years, Thomas Hussey, who died at the Old Folks' home, had never recorded the deed.

Dickinson, N. D.—The farmers' elevator at Belfield burned to the ground. The Dickinson department was called to assist the Belfield firemen in keeping the fire from spreading to other elevators. Work has already been started on a new modern, electrically equipped 50,000-bushel elevator to replace the one destroyed.

Ray, N. D.—Charles Orvedahl, residing south of here, was killed in an automobile accident a short distance from his home, the car overturning when he attempted to make a sharp turn at high speed.

Big Stone, S. D.—John Korte heard a commotion in his poultry yard and upon investigating found a large black eagle. He shot the eagle, which measured 7 feet and 5 inches from tip to tip of the wings.

Bismarck, N. D.—The State Railroad commission has joined hands with the railroads operating in North Dakota in an effort to avoid a car shortage, issuing a circular to elevator managers throughout the state, calling their attention to the desirability of quickly releasing the cars that are used by them.

Menno, S. D.—To be pinned to the ground when the automobile in which he was riding overturned, and to remain a prisoner in an unconscious condition for an hour or more before being found, was the experience of President Mosman of Freeman college on a public highway near here.

St. Paul—The state tax commission is considering 932 applications for correction and reduction in real estate assessments throughout the state. There are 401 objectors from Ramsey county, 23 from Hennepin, 29 from St. Louis and 447 from from other parts of the state. These petitions have been sent in within the last three months. The new applications in Hennepin county are said to indicate a better system of assessment in Minneapolis than in St. Paul. The tax commission has not rendered a final decision in any of the cases so far.

Grand Forks, N. D.—Registrations for the Fort Berthold lands which has been carried on at Minot, Plaza and Bismarck offices for the past thirteen days, closed at midnight Sat-

urday, with a total of 30,561 names entered for the 730 quarter sections of land which will be drawn, beginning today. There may be a few more than the number reported, as the total from Plaza may not be complete by a dozen names. Minot gave out 20,292 as the total there, registration continuing almost up to the closing hour of the office; 1,254 placed their names on the books Saturday. Bismarck reports 7,536 as the total for that office. Saturday's number was 765. Plaza's total as given some time before 12 o'clock was 2,731, but it is not expected that it will be many more than that.

Minneapolis—Miss Isabel Williams of St. Paul was elected president of the Minnesota Educational association. She received 1,112 votes and Prof. Maria Sanford 408. Miss Sanford had announced before balloting began Saturday that she could not accept if elected. Other officers elected are: Vice president, F. W. Dobbins, superintendent of schools, Little Falls; directors, Miss Dora Smith, Blaine school, Minneapolis, and Miss Mabel G. Price, Faribault. None of the latter had opposition.
