The first upright piano was invented in England and the United States by John Isaac Hawkins, in 1800, but they did not come into general use until many years thereafter. PHOTOPLAY BRINGS BERNHARDT TONIGHT IN "JEANNE DORE"

Mme. Sarah Bernhardt has, beyond reasonable question, been seen for the last time upon the American stage. In other days, this fact would have portend of a greater loss to her legion of admirers than now—for the moving picture has entered to perpetuate the glories of Bernhardt's life.

The cables have told how the famous tragedienne was forced to abruptly close her theater in Paris while she was appearing in "Jeanne Dore," to undergo the perils of a surgical operation. When she was discharged one of her lower limbs had been amputated and her recourse to an artificial support was undertaken.

Great as she has ever been, she has found the substitute an unconquerable deterrent to the complete return of her stage usefulness; she had previously been able to cunningly imitate lameness, but she has found it far more difficult to impersonate perfect locomotion upon an artificial support.

For all a vast majority of her auditors were able to discover, Bernhardt might as well have acted a silent drama—and, accordingly, when she comes to the Grand theater tonight in pictured pantomime her
