POLK COUNTY On the day before the expiration of his term of office, James Knox Polk, eleventh president of the United States gave his approval to the act of congress providing for the organization of Minnesota territory. This was March 3, 1849. This county, named in honor of President Polk, was established in 1858, just after Minnesota had become a state.

MAKES AN APPEAL. Under date of June 1, Frank B. Kellogg makes a personal appeal to the voters of Minnesota which clearly indicates that he is not hopeful of success at the primaries on the 19th inst.

Despite the claims of the Twin City papers that thinks are "looking reasonably well for Kellogg" and notwithstanding the rosette hue given to the accounts of the Kellogg meetings, a careful survey of the field at this time warrants the assertion that his candidacy is not meeting with popular favor.

Here is a concrete instance. In one of the larger cities in the first congressional district, the local paper supporting Kellogg, printed a list of names of the members of the executive committee of the Kellogg campaign club.

In commenting on this list a very prominent citizen of the town referred to, makes this statement in a letter: "This club, and the list of names printed, exists principally in the mind of the editor of the paper. As a matter of fact I am quite sure no such organization exists. The names listed have been hazarded, and a number of them will vote for the different candidates for U. S. senator. One of them is the local manager for Mr. Eberhart."

This is another instance to prove that the so-called Kellogg boom is largely artificial. It is, of course, backed up with ample funds, and with money galore at command, the Kellogg managers have endeavored to accomplish something substantial. But everything indicates that he will be third man in the race, and perhaps fourth.

The fact that Mr. Kellogg is issuing a personal letter at this date (June 1) and sending it all over the state makes it clearly manifest that the management of his campaign, notwithstanding that they are possessed with all kinds of "the where-withall," are neither sanguine or expectant of favorable results.

"In this contest," says Mr. Kellogg in his letter of June 1, "I shall discuss as far as possible the grave questions now confronting the American people and advocate the principles of preparedness for this country—for any possible emergency. These questions are more important than individuals.

"I shall visit as many portions of the state as may be possible during the limited time of the primary campaign, but I cannot expect to meet as many friends as I should like. It may be that I cannot meet you personally, but your well-known influence in the community leads me to believe that you are interested in advocating these great public policies, so I shall appreciate anything you can do to support them through your candidacy. If you would write me and outline the political conditions in your vicinity, it would be a very great pleasure to me.

"Very sincerely yours, Frank B. Kellogg."

Unless we are greatly mistaken the

majority of the people of Minnesota are as well informed on the subject of preparedness as Mr. Kellogg is.

They know that this present congress has passed an army bill—the Chamberlain-Hay bill—which brings the total maximum strength of our land forces up to more than one million men, within the next five years. They know that President Wilson has very recently asked the country to be patient and bear with the additional taxation that will be imposed upon the people to establish, equip and maintain this vast increase of land forces. They know that the president of the United States in the event of a threatened invasion is authorized to increase the force provided for in the Chamberlain-Hay bill to an unlimited number of volunteers.

They know that the American navy is to be expanded and extended to a degree beyond the expectation of a majority of the Naval League itself. They know that there is now under way, in every community, a detailed and specific plan of organization for surveying the industrial and commercial possibilities of the United States, and knowing all this, the good people of Minnesota, any one of them or all of them, might well ask Mr. Kellogg if he actually is foolish enough to think, that until congress provides some way to meet the five hundred million dollars which the army and navy legislation of this congress will authorize, there will not be, or cannot possibly be, any further program of preparedness, at least not until the present program, which will require five years to carry out, has been completed.

"Preparedness" indeed. It is, under the present conditions, a word of political conjuration.
