### SPOONER VILLAGE WELL JOB AWARDED

Spooner, Minn., Sept. 16.—Oscar Olson of Buhl was the only bidder for the contract to drill the Spooner flowing well. His bid was \$7 per foot, regardless of depth or rock encountered. The contracts calls for a seventy-five gallon flow per minute within a twenty-four hours test. The village well from which the water will be brought to all parts of Spooner by an adequate water system will be drilled on the corner south of Colburn avenue and east of Mill street, just outside of the village limits.

Contractor Olson will begin operations as soon as he has completed his other contracts that he has now under way at other localities.

### ARGENTINA'S GRAIN GOING TO ALLIES

(By United Press) Buenos Aires, Sept. 16.—Argentina's wheat has been sold almost exclusively to the Allies during the last six months. It has been shipped, with practically no exceptions, in British bottoms. The export was 1,379,962 tons, of which the United States took less than 100,000.
