PLEASED WITH CROP.
The following is from the Warren Sheaf: "V. Young of Unionville, Ia., passed through the city Monday on his way home from North Dakota, where he had been looking over his land. He expressed himself as well pleased with his crop this year, as he said that the crop in Iowa was not any better than here and at that the rent was so much higher than it is here. He said he sees no reason why there are no more Iowa people taking advantage of the land bargains in Northern Minnesota."

STATE TIMBER.
It has been contended that the state of Minnesota possessed no land containing more than three million feet of log lumber. This has never been successfully contradicted until the following statement of timber cut by the Virginia & Rainy Lake Lumber company of Virginia, Minn., was made to Oscar Arneson, chief land clerk of the state auditor's office.

The statement shows that during the present season on Sec. 36, Twp. 67, Range 20, Koochiching county, the following timber was cut:
Pine and other timber 4,842,410 feet
Value of cut to school fund \$44,430.18
Timber cut in construction of skidway and roads in removal of other timber 301.48
Scaling fee 509.24
Total due state \$45,240.90

WHO'S TIMID?
Apropos of President Wilson's declaration that he is "ashamed of the timidity of American business men" in the face of their foreign competitors, Leslie M. Shaw, former secretary of the treasury, points out that the late J. J. Hill showed no such timidity, that on the contrary, he showed great courage and enterprise in establishing a steamship line to the Orient, that the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. did the same thing, and that President Wilson, by signing the La Follette bill, signed the death warrant of American shipping on the Pacific, turning it over to the Japanese, and Governor Shaw points out further that it was "fear and trembling" in the face of what he conceived to be the wishes of the labor voters which made Mr. Wilson sign the seamanship bill. He says further that the late E. H. Harriman conceived the idea of a great railway system to traverse Mexico and connect this country by rail with all the Latin American republics and that by his Mexican policy Mr. Wilson has set back that project at least half a century, and that most of Mr. Wilson's Mexican policy has been prompted by his fear and trembling lest he lose so much political capital as might be made by the Democratic slogan, "He has kept us out of war."


